MARUFACTURING PRIORITIES FOR THE NEXT MAYOR OF GREATER MANCHESTER

1.

Invest in regional infrastructure, in particular through support for East-West rail links like HS3, to create a business environment where manufacturers can grow and thrive to support communities and create good jobs.

2.

Support manufacturers in the region to **deliver the jobs of future** through provision of skills and quality training facilities equivalent to the NWTC to allow manufacturers to train their apprentices in the Greater Manchester area.

3.

Continue to work with Westminster to **help deliver the 'levelling up' agenda**, particularly through the development of digital infrastructure to help manufacturers invest in 4.0 technology and take advantage of the roll out of Made Smarter in the area.


